FIRST READING: Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18

The Lord is a judge who is no respecter of personages. He shows no respect of personages to the detriment of a poor man, he listens to the plea of the injured party. He does not ignore the orphan's supplication, nor the widow's as she pours out her story. The man who with his whole heart serves God will be accepted, his petitions will carry to the clouds. The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds, until it arrives he is inconsolable nor will he desist until the Most High takes notice of him, acquits the virtuous and delivers judgement. REFLECTION:

Who are we as we come before God today? Poor, humble, weak, broken-hearted, ill exhausted, in need of God's mercy? God's face is always turned to such people. In the mass today, the penitential rite is a great opportunity to stand in that place of humility with the Tax collector. Presiders sometimes use their own words to introduce the prayers of mercy. I have heard one ask us to come to our God of Love and compassion 'for forgiveness of our sins, for peace in our hearts and healing in our lives'. Another calls us 'to reflect on our need for healing in our relationships with God, others, ourselves and our environment'. The penitential rite is a great equaliser, and reality check; we can all recognise aspects of ourselves that are rough and broken. We come to receive Jesus' gift of himself in Communion not because we are perfect, but because we are in need of him. He wants to feed and nourish us because we are hungry and thirsty. If we come to him full of ourselves, we may not appreciate this gift and we may leave unchanged. So let us be open to God's mercy and healing today.

Bulletin Article by Fr Lim: DAILY READING OF THE BIBLE WILL GIVE US "ROOTS AND WINGS."

There is a lot of wisdom in the saying, "If you want to live a responsible Christian life you have to read two things every day, the Bible and the daily newspaper; and never one without the other." The newspaper gives you the bad news (the devil is in the details) and the Bible gives you the Good News (God is in the big picture.) There are many other reasons why we should read the Bible every day.

First of all, these truths are so deep and rich that they cannot be absorbed at any one time. A text book cannot be exhausted in one reading. One must listen to a symphony many times before he can fully appreciate it. The painting of a great artist must be contemplated many times before it can be fully appreciated.

Another reason is that, according to the philosophical principle, whatever is received is received according to the disposition of the recipient. This is well illustrated in the life of Mark Twain who said that when he was sixteen he thought that his father was a fool. When he reached twenty he was surprised at how much his father had learned in those four years. Daily reading of the Bible will help us develop a sense of humour. A sense of humour, of course, is a sense of the humorous, the unexpected, the incongruous and the

preposterous. A sense of humour then is simply a sense of truth, a sense of reality that enables us to discern the untrue, the unreal, the incongruous, the preposterous. God is All-truth and the Really Real and therefore has a Divine Sense of Humour.

Repetition is the mother of learning. John Cardinal Newman used the illustration of the coffee percolator. As the water heats up it rises and flows over the coffee grounds. Each time it does this the coffee gets stronger and stronger. And so it is with these truths. Each time we go over them our understanding and conviction of them gets stronger.

Then there is the need to correct our image of God. Genesis tells us that God made us in His own image. And He saw that it was good. Since that time we have been making God in our own image. And that is not good. These human images of God must be checked constantly against the true image that God revealed to us in Jesus. We live in a culture that is definitely not Christian. Every value once held dear is being vigorously challenged and often ridiculed. Many of our contemporaries' doubt-ridden by the constant bombardment of the triune god of materialism, hedonism and consumerism are asking themselves, "Is life," as Shakespeare "a tale told by an idiot full of sound and fury signifying nothing?"

We have to reflect again and again on these Christian truths lest we lose our Christian identity, lest we forget who we are. We also live in an age of change, rapid and all-pervading change. It has become an age without roots. There is the widespread conviction that nothing is the same anymore. There is no denying, of course, that there has been many and great changes. But change is not annihilation. Change connotes continuity. In change there is always something that remains.

In Christianity there always remains the truth of Jesus Christ, true God and true man, the way, the truth, and the life, yesterday, today and the same forever. Jesus came not to destroy the law and the prophets but to fulfil them. He came not to make all new things, but to make all things new. This is also the age of specialization. The specialist gets to know more and more about less and less. There is the constant danger that he may lose perspective and take the part that he is specializing in for the whole.

There is, therefore, the constant need to return to the over-all picture of reality, the big picture, to return to our basic belief system not only to maintain perspective but also because it is our basic belief system that pervades and influences our every thought, word and deed. This is also the age of the knowledge explosion. We have a lust for knowledge. Our sum total of knowledge has more than doubled in the last few years. Most of this knowledge is of secondary causes. The sheer volume of it tends to blot out knowledge of the primary cause, God. With this vast increase in knowledge has come the temptation to think that salvation comes through knowledge. As if there were some hidden, salutary truths that one day the elite would discover. Scripture tells us, however, that God has hidden these things from the learned and the clever and revealed them to the merest children. We all know from our own experience that it is not much knowledge that satisfies the soul, but the intimate understanding and relish of the truth. It is the realization of the simple truth, the discovery of the obvious that leads to salvation. The daily reading of the Bible will give us "roots and wings." Fr.
